#### **Just Having Church**

Throughout the country, in regular church services, 178 received the baptism of the Holy Ghost and 168 were baptized in Jesus' name.

#### **Youth in Action**

In one region, the youth became active in evangelism and outreach, and as a result thirty-two were baptized in Jesus' name and five received the Holy Ghost.

#### **Paper Preacher Conversions**
