knew there were going to be a lot of details that had to work out but we felt the call so strongly we just continued to pray for His will as we watched him work out every detail. We even felt we had missed our calling when we went to AIM training as a mid 30 year old couple. The majority of the people there were much younger than us and most had just graduated from Bible college. We thought we had waited too long to do God's will and we had missed it. Then we were talking to a young couple there about how we felt and they surprised us by telling us they were thinking the complete opposite about us. They were hthinking, "they have so much more
